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SYLLABUS OVERVIEW

A course in Kreol Morisien at National School Certificate level will give candidates the opportunity to respond to a range of reading materials, including narrative and informative texts.

Candidates will also have the opportunity to show their writing skills by writing a range of text types that will prepare them for real-life situations and for further study.

In addition, candidates will be given the opportunity to develop their translation skills by translating texts from English and French into Kreol Morisien.

AIMS

The aims describe the educational purposes of a course in Kreol Morisien at National School Certificate level.

A qualification in this syllabus demonstrates that candidates can communicate effectively and accurately in standard Kreol Morisien.

More specifically, the syllabus aims at developing:

- the ability to communicate in Kreol Morisien accurately
- the ability to write different types of texts
- the ability to use language creatively and imaginatively
- sensitivity to how writers use language for particular effects
- the habit of reading of a wide range of texts in Kreol Morisien
- critical thinking skills and the ability to provide an informed personal response to information read
- the ability to translate texts from English and French into Kreol Morisien

ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVES

Assessment Objective 1: Writing

- Write structured responses on narrative, descriptive and argumentative topics
- Express what is thought, felt and imagined
- Use tone and register appropriate to the task set
- Use language creatively for particular effects
- Organise ideas and thoughts and express them coherently
- Select materials from a given text and write a summary
- Use a wide range of appropriate vocabulary
- Make accurate use of spelling, grammar and punctuation

Assessment Objective 2: Reading

- Show understanding of explicit meanings
- Show understanding of implicit meanings
- Show understanding of writer's craft and how language is used to trigger feelings and emotions
- Provide a personal response to what is read
- Identify facts and opinions
- Analyse and evaluate information provided in a text
- Identify a writer's attitude to a particular topic
- Select information for specific purposes

Assessment Objective 3: Translation

- Translate texts from English and French into Kreol Morisien, using accurate grammar and spelling and appropriate vocabulary.
- Show ability to transfer meaning from English and French into Kreol Morisien with accuracy

ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

Component	Duration	Weighting
Paper 1 – Writing (40 marks) Candidates complete two written tasks, the compulsory task in Section A and one task from Section B Section A: Functional Writing (20 marks) Candidates write 200-300 words on a functional writing task Section B: Creative Writing (20 marks) Candidates choose one question from a choice of a narrative, descriptive or argumentative essays. Candidates write 350-500 words.	1 hour 45 mins	40%
Paper 2 – Reading Comprehension (40 marks) Section A: Functional Reading (20 marks) Candidates read an informative passage and identify key ideas. Candidates then use their notes to write a summary of not more than 160 words. Candidates also answer questions requiring critical reading (distinguishing fact and opinion, providing personal opinions, identifying conclusions etc) Section B: Extended Reading (20 marks) Candidates respond to questions (explicit meaning, implicit meaning, vocabulary, writer's craft etc) based on a narrative passage.	1 hour 45 mins	40%
Paper 3 - Translation (20 marks) Section A: English to Kreol Morisien translation (10 marks) Translate a text of 150-175 words from English into Kreol Morisien Section B: French to Kreol Morisien translation (10 marks) Translate a text of 150-175 words from French into Kreol Morisien	1 hour	20%

DETAILS OF THE ASSESSMENT

PAPER 1 WRITING

Time: 1 hour 45 minutes,

40 marks. Weighting: 40% of the qualification.

This paper has two sections. Candidates answer in a separate answer booklet.

Section A: Functional Writing (20 marks)

Candidates are presented with one functional writing task (e.g article, eye-witness account, speech, letter, report etc.), relevant to the real world.

Candidates should write about 200-300 words to inform, persuade and fulfil the requirements of the given task.

10 marks are allocated for task fulfilment and 10 marks for use of language.

Section A covers the following assessment objectives:

- Use tone and register appropriate to the task set
- Organise ideas and thoughts and express them coherently
- Use a wide range of appropriate vocabulary
- Make accurate use of spelling, grammar and punctuation

Section B: Creative Writing (20 marks)

Candidates answer one question from a choice of essay titles. Candidates will be given a choice of two argumentative, two descriptive and two narrative essays to choose from.

Candidates are required to write between 350 and 500 words.

Section B covers the following assessment objectives:

- Write structured responses on narrative, descriptive and argumentative topics
- Express what is thought, felt and imagined
- Use tone and register appropriate to the task set
- Use language creatively for particular effects
- Organise ideas and thoughts and express them coherently
- Use a wide range of appropriate vocabulary
- Make accurate use of spelling, grammar and punctuation

PAPER 2: READING

Time: 1 hour 45 minutes

40 marks. Weighting: 40% of the qualification

This paper has two sections. Candidates answer on the question paper.

Section A: Informative Passage (20 marks)

In Section A, candidates read a documentary-style informative passage of around 700 words. They then answer a number of questions based on this text:

- Identifying and writing down required information (e.g advantages and disadvantages, actions and consequences, causes and effects, problems and solutions etc.)
 - 10 marks are allocated to content points.
- Writing a summary of not more than 160 words with the information identified.
 5 marks are allocated to the summary writing task, based on relevance and ability to link ideas and write coherently.
- Candidates then answer short answer questions requiring critical thinking
 (distinguishing between fact and opinion, writer's attitude, providing personal response etc.)

5 marks are allocated to these short answer questions.

The following assessment objectives are addressed in Section A:

- Show understanding of explicit meanings
- Analyse and evaluate information provided in a text
- Organise ideas and thoughts and express them coherently
- Provide a personal response to what is read
- Identify facts and opinions
- Identify a writer's attitude to a particular topic
- Select information for specific purposes
- Select materials from a given text and write a summary

Section B: Narrative Passage (20 marks)

In Section B, candidates read a narrative passage of approximately 700 words.

They then answer short answer and multiple-choice questions on the given text.

The following assessment objectives are addressed in Section B:

- Show understanding of explicit meanings
- Show understanding of implicit meanings
- Analyse and evaluate information provided in a text
- Show understanding of writer's craft and how language is used to trigger feelings and emotions

PAPER 3: TRANSLATION (20 MARKS)

Time: 1 hour

20 marks. Weighting: 20% of the qualification.

This paper has two sections and candidates answer on the question paper.

Section A: Translation from English to Kreol Morisien

Candidates will be presented with a passage of 150-175 words in English and required to translate it into Kreol Morisien.

10 marks are allocated to this task.

Section B: Translation from French to Kreol Morisien

Candidates will be presented with a passage of 150-175 words in French and required to translate it into Kreol Morisien.

10 marks are allocated to this task.

The following assessment objectives are addressed in Paper 3:

- Translate texts from English and French into Kreol Morisien, using accurate grammar and spelling and appropriate vocabulary.
- Show ability to transfer meaning from English and French with accuracy

OTHER USEFUL INFORMATION

GRADING AND REPORTING

Results in the National School Certificate are shown by one of the grades A*, A, B, C, D or E, indicating the standard achieved. A* is the highest and E the lowest. 'Ungraded' indicates that the candidate's performance did not meet the minimum requirements for Grade E. Numerical grades are also provided.

Candidates can retake the National School Certificate in Kreol Morisien as many times they want. This is a linear qualification so candidates cannot sit for individual components again.
